### Field School Program

The University of Hawai'i, in collaboration with the National Tropical Botanical Garden, will offer a unique program in archaeological field methods with a special emphasis in palaeoecology. Students will excavate at *Makauwahi* Cave, a site of remarkable cultural and paleoecological finds. In addition to excavation, students will learn survey, mapping, and a variety of laboratory skills. Our program includes several field trips around the beautiful Island of Kaua'i.

- ANTH 381 or 668 (Archaeological Field Techniques) 6 credits
- ANTH 464 (Hawaiian Archaeology) 3 credits
- ZOOL 450 (Natural History of the Hawaiian Islands) 3 credits

### Tuition & Expenses

Program costs include tuition (\$2568, undergraduate; or \$3432, graduate) for 12 semester credit hours and a field school fee (\$1575, non-resident; or \$400 resident) covering accommodation, meals, local transportation, and field excursions.
